Luxemburg-Casco FFA Alumni Kiddy Showmanship Show

The L-C FFA Alumni is sponsoring the Kiddy Showmanship show at the Kewaunee County Fair on Sunday, July 16, 2023 at 2:00 p.m. in the west end of the Show pavillion:

1. The **calf** must be born between **March 1 and June 1** of the current year. It can be a heifer, steer, or bull. Calves from Jr. or Open class may be used.
2. There are two classes: 1st and 2nd grade, or Preschool and Kindergarten.
This is the year that the child just finished.
3. The calves must be brought to the fair by 1PM on Sunday.
4. Let your calf rest before the show begins.
5. Children will be judged on the way they handle the calf and basic showmanship skills.
- 6. NO coaching from the sidelines!!** Failure to follow this rule will result in disqualification.
- 7. IF YOUR CHILD’S CALF IS NOT TRAINED TO WALK, YOU WILL NEED TO HELP YOUR CHILD IN THE RING.**
8. If you have children in each group, they may show the same calf; however, this is discouraged because a young calf will tire easily. If you have two children in the same group, you will need two calves.
9. Children are required to wear a number, which is passed out prior to the show and **needs to be returned following the show.**
It is strongly suggested that children wear white clothes.
10. Trophies and ribbons, will be awarded, sponsored by the Luxemburg-Casco FFA Alumni.
- 11. CALVES MUST HAVE A NEGATIVE BVD TEST.**

2023 Kewaunee County Fair Small Animal Open Class & Jr. Fair Exhibitor Barn Rules

Check-In: No birds or rabbits may be unloaded prior to 8 a.m. on Wednesday and all must be checked in by the superintendent. All birds shall be in place by 4 p.m. and weigh -in will be at 12:30 p.m. Rabbits shall be in place by 3 p.m. All market rabbits will be weighed between 3-4 p.m. on Wednesday.

Poultry exhibitors must care for their own birds twice daily and furnish all feeds along with necessary cleaning of the cages. All fowl with external parasites will be sent home and no substitutes will be allowed. Please examine and treat your entries prior to entry day.

Rabbit exhibitors must care for their own rabbits twice daily and furnish all feeds and watering equipment along with necessary cleaning of the cages. All rabbits showing evidence of disease will be sent home and no rabbits may be substituted in its place. All rabbits must have their exhibitor's number written in the left ear in waterproof ink or tattooed in the left ear. No does with litters are allowed.

All exhibitors are responsible for getting their animal to the judging table. Consult your barn superintendent if there is a problem or conflict. No buying or selling of any animals will be permitted during the fair.

No electrical food appliances are allowed in the barn (microwave, refrigerator, crock pots, pizza ovens, etc.)

Ensure decorations are unable to be reached by the animals inside all cages.

Barn will close at 10:00 p.m. Barn Superintendents have the authority and will be treated with respect.

Animals may not leave the fairgrounds prior to release time on Sunday. Decorations may be taken down after 4:30 p.m. Animals will be released by barns and assigned times. Check with your barn superintendent for your release times.

NO EXHIBITOR OR EXHIBITOR'S PARENT MAY APPROACH A JUDGE WITHOUT A SUPERINTENDENT PRESENT AND MUST BE DONE AFTER ALL JUDGING IS COMPLETE.

Any youth exhibitor who is smoking, possessing, or consuming alcoholic beverages, or illegal drugs will be immediately requested to vacate the grounds and forfeit all rights to premiums and participation in the show.

I hereby agree to abide by the above and all rules governing the care, stalling/pens, and showing at the Kewaunee County Fair. I understand that failure to abide by these rules may result in disciplinary action by the Kewaunee County Fairboard. The action may include removal of all my exhibits, animals, and myself from the Kewaunee County Fair for a period of one year. Further disciplinary actions may be imposed by your governing group.

Open & Jr. entries close June 1st.
Buildings will be open for public
viewing from 9 am - 10 pm.

No beer or intoxicating liquor shall be brought into any exhibition buildings.

Any exhibitor in possession or control of any beer or intoxicating liquor in the exhibition buildings shall forfeit any and all premiums they may have earned at the Fair. Such exhibitors may also be requested to remove their exhibits from the Fairgrounds immediately.

1. Any exhibitor involved in acts of violence, fighting or demonstrating poor sportsmanship or showmanship, thereby setting poor examples for youth or adult exhibitors, shall be required to remove their exhibits from the Fairgrounds immediately and shall forfeit any and all premiums they may have earned. Decisions pertaining to the above shall be made by the Fair Board after consultations with the individuals involved, the Department Superintendents and other witnesses.
2. Entry forms will only be accepted from youth involved in a 4-H club, Vo-Ag I, Home-Ec, or Scouts. Junior exhibitors must be in good standing with their respective club, chapter, or troop. Scouts may only exhibit in areas / projects where a badge has been earned. FFA: may only exhibit in areas/projects which are part of classroom study. Regardless of youth organization affiliation, all youth must abide by 4-H project area guidelines.
3. Completed entry forms are due from the exhibitor online on the Kewaunee Co. Fair website (www.kewauneecountyfair.com) or postmarked on or before June 1st to Darlene Boeder (Exhibit Coordinator). Late entries will not be accepted.

4. Youth exhibitors must be in grades 5K-13, the grade just completed. 5K-2nd grade are cloverbuds and may only exhibit as cloverbuds

5. Exhibitors who live in Kewaunee County but belong to a club, chapter or organization outside of Kewaunee County may exhibit at either county fair. Exhibitors who live outside of Kewaunee County, but belong to a club, chapter or organization in Kewaunee County may exhibit at either county fair. May only exhibit at one county fair per year.

6. Articles entered in one class cannot be entered to compete in any other class, except for herd premiums.

7. All premiums will be paid whether there is competition or not, if of merit

8. No two members of the same family may exhibit the same item.

9. Exhibits in the junior fair shall be the product of the exhibitor's own labor. The exhibit may include a study project, merit project or other special project, a skill area, or a supervised occupational experience in which the exhibitor is regularly enrolled, provided that the fair board approves.

10. Any Junior Fair entry with the wrong department, class, or item/lot number is a wrong entry. ALL ENTRIES NOT ENTERED CORRECTLY WILL BE PLACED ONE PLACING BELOW THEIR JUDGED MERIT. The entry will not be eligible for championship or other awards.

11. No exhibit may be larger than 14x22x24. Exhibits exceeding this size will be disqualified & sent home.

12. No article, except livestock, may be exhibited in any other year.

13. All best of show awards or champion are given out to blue ribbon exhibits only.

14. An exhibitor may enter only one item per lot number.

15. Junior Fair exhibits cannot be entered in the open class.

16. Entry tags must be securely fastened to the article exhibited.

17. Entries will be checked in by the superintendent in the department. Entries must be checked out with superintendents on duty between 5-7 pm on the last day of the fair.

18. The fair will be open to the

public from Wednesday through Sunday. Exhibition buildings will be open from 9 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. each day, except for Sunday which closes at 5 pm.

19. No electrical food appliances are allowed in the barns. Exhibitors should refrain from eating in the barns, setting an example for the public as signs are posted on the barns.

20. Transfer or loan of season tickets or badges will be considered as a fraud upon the association and shall be subject to cancellation.

21. All immoral shows and gambling schemes will be excluded from the grounds.

22. The Fair Board will have the immediate control and management of the grounds and the general supervision of all stock and articles exhibited. The Fair Board will have full supervision of the entries and privileges at Luxemburg, Wisconsin.

23. Entries must specify owner's name and post office address and in case of animals, the sex, breed and description.

24. No animal or article can be entered in the name of other than the bonafide owner or owners, and any violation of this rule will forfeit any premium that may be awarded to such exhibitor.

25. All purebred stock must be registered in American Registry, if such has been established, and certificate of registry or evidence of pure breeding will in all cases be required before entering the same.

26. Stalls will be furnished free of charge to exhibitors in the Open & Jr. Fair. Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding. Excessive use of straw is prohibited. Shaving only will be used in horse stalls (NO straw). Bed Pack guidelines: Pack should NOT exceed 10ft. for cows. Heifers and calves should be less. (see barn rules in back of book) Barns will be closed at 10:00 pm each night. No stall rent will be charged.

27. Fair veterinarian has authority to check all animals participating in the Kewaunee County Fair. Requests for veterinary assistance will be billed directly to exhibitors.

28. Any person responsible for antibiotic contamination will be held liable for any financial loss.

29. All youth livestock exhibitors must have current YQCA certification. Copy to be handed in by 4pm on Wednesday.

30. NO selling of animals or "FOR SALE" signage will be allowed during the fair.

31. Please READ complete barn rules and all necessary paper work in back of this book (sign & hand in).

EXHIBITORS

32. The Fair board will take every precaution in their power for the safe preservation of stock or other exhibits while on the grounds, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

33. All exhibitors are expected to abide by rules governing care & showing of animals on the fairgrounds. Failure to obey may result in disqualification, expulsion from fairgrounds, and/or ineligibility to enter following year & loss of premiums.

34. All personally owned off-road vehicles used on the fairgrounds shall submit a certificate of insurance to the fair board president PRIOR to the start of the fair.

35. Any exhibitor (Open or Jr.) who removes animals or exhibits prior to release time will unable to exhibit for a period of at least one

year. NO PREMIUMS WILL BE PAID ON EXHIBITS REMOVED.

In cases of extreme hardship, special permission for earlier removal may be granted by the Fair Board in advance of the fair in writing.

36. The Kewaunee County Ag. Asso. Will provide reasonable security form all exhibits but assumes no liability for exhibits damaged or lost during exhibition period. Exhibitors assume full responsibility for their exhibit(s) if not picked up before 7 PM on the last day of the fair.

STATE LAW

This Law To Be Enforced

Section 3571. Any person who shall willfully and without right enter any agricultural or individual Fair grounds, which is enclosed by a fence

not less than six feet high, during any fair exhibition, by climbing over or passing through or under such fence, or by using a ticket or badge of some other person, or in any other way shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$50.00.

The Fair Board will not be responsible for any personal injury or accident sustained by an exhibitor, employee or patron.

NOTICE - According to a circular letter received from the Wisconsin State Board of Health of Madison, WI, it is necessary for those who follow the business of supplying food and drinks to visitors or exhibitors at the Fair to obtain a restaurant permit.

PROTESTS

37. All judges have been carefully selected. All exhibitors must accept these judges and agree to abide by their assessment of the exhibit. Any protests shall be submitted in writing and delivered to the superintendent of the associated department on the same day.

JUDGES

38. Any exhibitor or their agent who shows any disrespect or use of disrespectful language to any judge or superintendent while in the performance of his duty shall forfeit any awards that may have been made to him and be barred from further exhibits in the show rings and shall forfeit all premiums awarded and will be excluded from further competition.

39. When exhibits are not deemed worthy, the judge will refuse to award a premium.

40. Any premium found to have been obtained under false pretenses, or misrepresentation, or violation of any rule, will have all premium money withheld.

41. When respectfully requested, the judges are expected to give the reason for their decision, stating what constitutes special points of excellence in the class of animals or articles being considered and pointing out the superiority of one over another.

42. Open class animals must have a certificate of registry from the respective Breed Assn. or society. All livestock shown in the Purebred Classes must have registration

papers or proof that application for registry has been made. Animals not meeting this requirement must be shown as grades.

43. Judges will make their reports of awards to the superintendents in charge properly signed, as soon as the awards are made.

44. The Fair board reserves the full and absolute right to interpret the foregoing rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine matters, questions, and difficulties in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with or incident to the Fair.

LIVESTOCK

Each club must call Darlene Boeder with stall allocations by **June 14th** (920-676-4580)

45. LIVESTOCK SHOWN AT ANY OTHER COUNTY FAIR MAY NOT BE EXHIBITED AT THE KEWAUNEE COUNTY FAIR.

46. All livestock must be shown in the showing, either by the exhibitor or by another member from his or her club or chapter.

47. Livestock (Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goats) exhibitors must check with the superintendent of the departments before unloading animals. All livestock animals must be Vet checked before entering buildings. All animals requiring Vet check must be in the fairgrounds by 4 PM on check-in day.

48. Exhibitors failing to properly care for their animals at the fair will forfeit any premium money earned and will not be allowed to exhibit in next year's fair. ATCP 160.05

Open division; general requirements. (1) The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into multiple premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for the last place in the class.

(2) All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

(3) State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one

premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.

(4) State aid may not be used to award a premium to an exhibitor who exhibits an item or animal that has been exhibited in open class division previously in a state aid funded fair in that calendar year and resulted in a premium being awarded for that item or animal.

(5) The fair board may establish specific classes by professional and amateur level groupings within classes for open class departments 14 to 28.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; general requirements. (1) Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.

(2) (a) Except as provided under par. (b), no fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered. Registered status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.

(b) Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

(3) Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.

(4) Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.

(5) The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.08 Class definitions; individual classes. (1) DAIRY CATTLE. (a) A spring calf is one born on or after March 1 of the exhibit year.

(b) A winter calf is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year.

(c) A fall calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between June 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A spring yearling is one whose date of birth is between March 1 and May 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A winter yearling is one whose date of birth is between December 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and February 28 or 29 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(g) A fall yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and November 30 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(h) A 2 year-old is one born between September 1 of the third year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year. A 2-year-old includes a yearling that has freshened.

(i) A 3 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the third year preceding the exhibit year.

(j) A 4 year-old is one whose date of birth is between September 1 of the fifth year preceding the exhibit year and August 31 of the fourth year preceding the exhibit year.

(2) BEEF CATTLE. (a) A junior calf is one born on or after January 1 of the exhibit year. The calf shall be at least 4 months old at the time of exhibit.

(b) A senior calf is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A summer yearling is one whose date of birth is between May 1 and August 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(d) A junior yearling is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and April 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(e) A senior yearling is one whose date of birth is between September 1 and December 31 of the second year preceding the exhibit year.

(f) A 2 year-old or older cow is one born before September 1 of the second year preceding the exhibit year and which has calved during the past year.

(4) SWINE. (a) A junior yearling boar or sow is one born between January 1 and June 30 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(b) A senior boar or sow is one whose date of birth is between July 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A senior spring boar or sow pig is one whose date of birth is between January 1 and February 28 or 29 of the exhibit year. A fair board may subdivide this entry class into January-born and February-born sows or boars.

(d) A junior spring boar or sow pig is one born during the month of March of the exhibit year.

(5) SHEEP. (a) A spring lamb is one born on or after February 16 of the exhibit year.

(b) A fall lamb is one born between September 1 and December 31 of the year preceding the exhibit year.

(c) A winter lamb is one born between January 1 and February 15 of the exhibit year.

(d) A yearling ram or ewe is one born outside the date of birth limitations in pars.

(a) through (c). The age of yearlings may be subject to verification by a veterinarian's examination whose findings shall be final.

ATCP 160.09 Class definitions; group classes. (1) DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE. (a) A dairy junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull. All of these animals shall be under 2 years of age, and not more than one may be a bull. A beef junior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of the same bull and are animals in the junior calf, senior calf, or the summer yearling, bull and heifer classes, with both sexes to be represented.

(b) A dairy and beef senior get of sire shall consist of 3 animals which are the offspring of one sire. All of these animals shall be 2 years of age or over. In either a dairy or beef breed get of sire, the name of the sire shall be designated by the exhibitor. The animals need not be owned by a single exhibitor.

(c) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 animals of any age or sex which are the produce of one cow.

(d) A group of 3 best female cattle shall consist of 3 animals of any age which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(2) SWINE. A pen of 3 feeder pigs shall consist of swine of either sex each weighing between 40 and 60 pounds. Any male pigs included in the pen shall be castrated and healed.

(3) SHEEP. (a) A get of sire shall consist of 4 lambs or yearlings, or both, of either sex, from one sire, which were bred and are owned by the exhibitor.

(b) An exhibitor's flock shall consist of one yearling or ram lamb, 2 yearling ewes and 2 ewe lambs which are owned by the exhibitor.

(c) A junior division pair of lambs may include a spring or fall ram and spring or fall ewe lamb owned by the exhibitor.

(d) A junior division flock shall be comprised of 3 sheep consisting of a yearling or lamb ram, a ewe lamb, and a yearling ewe, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(4) GOATS. (a) An Exhibitor's herd shall consist of one doe under one year of age, one yearling doe and one doe 2 years old or older, all of which are owned by the exhibitor.

(b) A senior get of sire shall consist of 3 does which are the get of one sire, with at least one in milk. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor, but all shall be in the senior age group.

(c) A junior get of sire shall consist of three does under 2 years of age which have never freshened and are the get of one sire. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

(d) A produce of dam shall consist of 2 does of any age which are the produce of one doe. Both animals shall be owned by the same exhibitor.

(e) A dam and daughter shall consist of one doe of any age and its dam. The animals need not be owned by the same exhibitor.

2023 STATE, COUNTY & DISTRICT FAIRS RULES & REGULATIONS OF ANIMAL HEALTH

GENERAL REGULATIONS AND PRECAUTIONS

Animals or fowl of any class which show symptoms of disease or which come from an area which is considered exposed or quarantined because of the presence of a highly contagious disease, cannot be shown at Wisconsin Fairs.

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer protection urges that every precaution be taken on the part of exhibitors to use individual utensils in caring for the animals. **COMMON WATERING TROUGHS ARE FORBIDDEN.**

The Department also urges the necessity of all exhibitors thoroughly cleaning and disinfecting ALL VEHICLES which are used to transport animals to and from the Fair.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection may be used in lieu of an Interstate Health Certificate or health certificate.

RIGHT TO DETERMINE DISEASE STATUS

The Fair has the right to make such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal exhibited and to exclude or remove any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with any contagious disease.

All animals found to be afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease shall be removed from the Fair premises under a permit from the Department. All exhibitors must comply with the provisions set forth below. The attending Veterinarian and the Department shall have the authority to conduct such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal and shall exclude or cause the removal of any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with any contagious, infectious or communicable disease.

HEALTH RECORDS

ALL OUT OF STATE persons exhibiting livestock at any fair or livestock exhibition in Wisconsin shall have a copy of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or Interstate Health Certificate available for inspection by the Department at the fair or livestock exhibition, or file a copy of such certificates at the show or fair office for the duration of the exhibit. A health certificate is valid for 30 days unless extended by species.

PARASITES

Cattle infected with mange, scab or ringworm may not be exhibited at any fair or other livestock exhibition. Animals found to be infected, or showing evidence of infection with mange, scab or ringworm after arrival at a fair or other livestock exhibition shall be isolated from other animals susceptible to the disease and removed from the premises. This shall not apply to animals showing evidence of ringworm infection if in the opinion of the attending Veterinarian of such fair or exhibition, the lesion is inactive and not capable of transmitting the disease.

WARTS

Bovine animals infected with warts may not be exhibited at livestock exhibitions. Animals with evidence of wart infection will be examined by the fair Veterinarian and the animal ordered to be removed from the premises unless the Veterinarian finds the warts are not capable of transmitting the disease.

QUARANTINE

Livestock under quarantine by the Department are not eligible for exhibition.

PENALTIES

Section 95.19 of the Wisconsin Statutes provides in part: "No persons shall. . . exhibit at any fair any animal afflicted with or exposed to any contagious or

Kewaunee County requires all hogs being exhibited at the fair have an Intra-State Movement Certificate or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection to be filed with the Kewaunee County Fair upon animal check-in.

infectious disease." It is a misdemeanor to exhibit animals contrary to this section. In addition, it is provided that any person violating this provision shall be liable to any other person who sustains damages by reason of such violations.

SUMMARY

If a fair or livestock exhibition lasts more than 24 hours the sponsors shall appoint a licensed Veterinarian to conduct a daily inspection of all livestock at the fair or exhibition. The Veterinarian shall review all records and test results required under ATCP 10.87. If a fair or exhibition lasts less than 24 hours, all records or test results required by ATCP 10.87 shall be reviewed by a licensed Veterinarian or by the show chairperson. Records shall include exhibitors name and address, identification of animals exhibited including number, type and description, documentation to show compliance with disease testing and other health requirements, and the livestock premises code, if any, of the premises from which the animals originate This is a summary of DATCP animal health requirements for exhibition only. These requirements may change due to animal disease emergence in Wisconsin or other states, for example vesicular stornatitis in the western states. It is always advisable to check with the Division of Animal Health (608-224-4874) for the most recent health requirements when planning to exhibit animals. Animals meeting exhibition requirements may not meet all import or movement requirements for other purposes. The fair and WDATCP have the right to make such tests and examinations as may be necessary to determine the disease status of any animal exhibited and to exclude or remove any animal afflicted with or suspected of being afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease. If at any time any animal shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be immediately removed from the exhibit and slaughtered or quarantined as directed by the Department.

CATTLE AND BISON

Cattle affected with ringworm, warts, mange or scab may not be exhibited, unless the Veterinarian in charge determines the ringworm lesions or warts are inactive and incapable of transmitting the disease. Any cattle found with ringworm, warts, mange or scab that are active shall be removed from the premises of the fair.

CATTLE ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN

There are no test or health document requirements for Wisconsin cattle. However, fair management is responsible for maintaining records of

2023 Kewaunee County Fair Dairy & Livestock Open class & Jr. Fair Exhibitor Barn Rules

Check-In: All animals that have been granted stalling privileges must be brought to the fairgrounds during the time designated (WED 8am-4pm) and all animals will be vet checked by Dairyland Veterinary Service prior to being unloaded and entering the barns. Kewaunee County requires that all cattle, beef, sheep, or goats must have the Kewaunee Co. Fair Animal Identification sheet turned in at check in. All cattle must test negative for BVD-PI by blood test or ear notch. A **copy** of the BVD-PI negative results must also be turned in. All hogs being exhibited must have the WI Intra-State Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and a copy of the negative Saliva rope test results to be filed with the Kewaunee County Fair upon animal check-in. Premise ID must be on all paperwork. All exhibitor meeting held at 3:30pm on Wednesday in the show pavilion, all exhibitors to attend. **All trailers left on the fairgrounds will be parked west of the horse ring. Trailers parked elsewhere will be towed at the owner's expense.**

Care of Animals: Exhibitor is solely responsible for the care of their animals to include feed, water and clean bedding. Exhibitors must have all major cleaning done prior to 9:00am. All steers will be double tied. Beef calves should be tied while nursing. Parlor morning milking should be completed by 9:00am (Dairy & Goats). Milking parlor hours will be posted after 3x milking is established. Feed should be kept in your trailers and no large bales will be allowed in the barn. **COMMON WATER BUCKETS** may only be used by exhibitors from the same farm/barn.

Animal stalls or pens: Cows-4ft. Heifers-3ft. Calves-2ft. Tack-8ft. maximum Clubs shall give an honest count on animals. Any free space due to animals not present will be given to other clubs. **Red** pack should not exceed 10ft for large cows, heifers and calves shall be less. All manure/straw must be free of trash (twine, paper, cans, bottles, etc). Trash is to be placed in the trash barrels. Aisles should be raked (dairy), swept and limed (livestock). Decking will be allowed above the hog, sheep and goat pens. It must be kept neat and orderly, ensuring that no animal can reach any items stored above them. Assigned tack pens will be for all exhibitors to use, no padlocks will be allowed. Fitting chutes will **NOT** be allowed in the barns.

Wash Rack: A schedule will be posted and each club is responsible to have exhibitors to clean for their assigned time. A contact person from each club will be needed. Please pick up after yourself and your animal, don't leave wash items out on the wash rack. Please turn the water faucets off and coil the hoses after each use. **The wash rack is to be shared by both barns, Sheep & Beef will have priority on their show day and the same goes for Dairy on their show day.** Exhibitors are encouraged to work together. Barn superintendents will supervise the wash rack .

Exhibitor Clothes & Shoes: All exhibitors will wear shoes/boots (**NO flip-flops, crocks, sandals, or open toed shoes**) while handling animals or while on barn duty. Appropriate clothes and show clothing will be worn while on barn duty or in the show ring (clothing must cover undergarments). Remember you are representing your family, your farm, your club, and your county.

Use of Show Ring: The show ring can be used for pre-show practice and must have adult supervision by exhibitor's parent and superintendent. All activity must be approved by the fair board. **Assistance will be needed between the shows to move fences, gates, panels, etc. and all exhibitors are strongly encouraged to help with this task.**

Decorations: No decorations may extend below the boards supplied for decorations. This will give all decorations a uniform appearance and animals will not be tempted to reach them. Decorations may not block any windows or fans. **NO POSTS** will be driven in the barns due to underground electric and gas lines. If you wish to have gates between your animals, floor stands may be used.

No electrical food appliances are allowed in the barn (microwave, refrigerator, crock pot, pizza oven, etc.)

Barns will close at 10:00pm. Lights will be turned down at that time. Exhibitors may not sleep overnight in the barn. Barn superintendents have the authority and will be treated with respect.

Animals may not leave the fairgrounds prior to release time on Sunday. Any animals removed prior to release time will have the exhibitor subject to disciplinary actions set forth by the fair board's discretion. Decorations may be taken down after 4:30pm. Animals will be released by barns and assigned times. Check with your superintendent for your release times.

persons who have exhibited at the fair, the livestock premises code, if any, and the identification of animals shown for, 5 years. Acceptable forms of animal identification for breeding animals are (1) an official metal ear tag, (2) a breed registration number, (3) a breed registration tattoo or (4) other identification approved by the department. For steers, either an official identification as listed for breeding animals or the ear tag applied at weigh-in may be used. Entry blanks submitted and signed by exhibitors, including one of the forms of identification listed above will fulfill the exhibitor requirements.

CATTLE ORIGINATING FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall accompany all cattle documenting animal identification (see above) and all tests or certifications required. Animals must meet normal Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement. <http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/AnimalMovement/CattleBison/index.aspx>. Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement.

Cattle from Brucellosis Certified Free herds in Class A states may enter Wisconsin without a prior brucellosis test if the certified herd number and the last test date appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

All cattle originating from Modified Accredited Advanced states shall have a negative tuberculosis test within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for a current listing of these states. Dairy cattle imported from states not recognizing Wisconsin's Tuberculosis Free status shall be required to have a negative Tuberculosis test for any cattle within 60 days of import. Call the Division of Animal Health for any changes to the list of these states. Cattle originating from Tuberculosis Accredited Free herds (except Michigan) may enter without a prior tuberculosis test if the accredited herd number appears on the certificate. Cattle originating from Modified Accredited states (Michigan) must have a permit number a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the cattle will be returning to the state of origin directly after the show, and documentation of special Tuberculosis testing. Each animal attending a fair must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd

the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in their testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition. Cattle from Canada may be exhibited in Wisconsin if they meet current federal requirements to cross the international border.

**SWINE
SWINE ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN**

All swine shall be accompanied by a Wisconsin Intrastate Movement Certificate stating that the herd of origin has been inspected on the farm within 30 days prior to the exhibition and no apparent disease has been present in the herd for the past 30 days. The certificate must also include all required test documentation. Non-Terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition. Include test date, type and results of the CVI.

**SHEEP
SHEEP ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN**
Sexually-intact sheep of any age, and all other sheep 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

SHEEP ORIGINATING FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN
All sheep shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All sheep must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sheep exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin.

**GOATS
GOATS ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN**
Sexually-intact goats of any age, and all other goats 12 months of age and older must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Sexually intact goats

exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to exhibit.

GOATS ORIGINATING FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN
All goats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. All goats must be identified with official scrapie ear tags or other official individual identification. Goats exposed to scrapie will not be allowed to enter Wisconsin. Goats originating from Modified Accredited state (Michigan and Minnesota) must have a permit number, a certificate of veterinary inspection which includes a statement that the goats will be returning to the state of origin directly after the show, and documentation of the special tuberculosis testing: Each animal attending a fair must have a negative individual TB test within 60 days of the date of import, and the herd the animal comes from must have a negative whole-herd TB test (for animals one year and older) within 12 months of the date of import. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874, well in advance of the fair or exhibition, to determine any changes in the testing requirements. Animals for exhibition from Modified Accredited states are required to return directly to the state origin after exhibition.

**EQUINE
EQUINE ANIMALS ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN**
All equine animals shall be accompanied by documentation (original laboratory report VS 10-11 or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test conducted within the current 12 months and which clearly identifies the equine by a registration number, lip tattoo or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine.

EQUINE ANIMALS ORIGINATING FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN
All equine animals shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have been tested negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA) test conducted within the current 12 months. The Certificate must clearly identify the equine by a registration number, lip tattoo or freeze brand, or a complete description of the equine animal.

LLAMAS AND EXOTIC RUMINANTS

LLAMAS, ALPACAS, AND EXOTIC RUMINANTS ORIGINATING FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN

There are no requirements. Llamas and Alpacas originating from outside Wisconsin All llamas and Alpacas must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have official animal identification.

Exotic Ruminants originating from within Wisconsin There are no requirements.

EXOTIC RUMINANTS ORIGINATING FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN

Exotic Ruminants are required to have a written import permit, must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and have official animal identification.

A negative Tuberculosis, within 60 days prior to import, and a negative Brucellosis test, within 30 days prior to import, shall be recorded on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which is faxed to the Division of Animal Health (608-224-4871) prior to the import permit being issued.

POULTRY

All poultry and waterfowl must originate from flocks designated as U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or NPIP Affiliate flock and accompanied by a NPIP certificate or originate from a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock and be accompanied by an enrollment certificate provided by the department certifying that they are a Wisconsin Tested Flock or Wisconsin Associate Flock. Sexually mature birds that do not meet these requirements may qualify with documentation of a negative test for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) conducted within 90 days prior to arrival at the exhibition, and be individually identified with a wing band or leg band.

Turkeys that are not going directly to slaughter may not be commingled with other poultry. This may be accomplished by separate housing or controlling the air flow or placement and spacing to prevent movement of M. gallisepticum from other poultry to the turkeys. The fair veterinarian should make this decision.

CERVIDAE

Cervidae originating from within Wisconsin

All cervidae must be officially identified, be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, be

enrolled in a CWD monitoring program meeting the requirements of ATCP 10.56 and originate from an accredited TB-free herd, qualified TB-free herd, monitored herd-tested within 90 days of movement, or the farm-raised deer is tested negative on two single cervical tuberculin tests conducted 90 to 270 days apart, isolated and the second test within 90 days of the date of movement.

Cervidae originating from outside Wisconsin

All cervidae must have a pre-entry permit number from the department and approved by the State Veterinarian (phone: 608-224-4874), official identification, a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, and meet Wisconsin requirements for interstate movement (ATCP 10.55). Cervidae originating from Michigan or Minnesota must have a permit and require special Tuberculosis testing. Exhibitors should contact the Division of Animal Health at 608-224-4874 well in advance of the fair or exhibition to determine their testing requirements.

DOGS AND DOMESTIC CATS

Dogs and cats originating from within Wisconsin

Dogs over 5 months of age must have proof of current rabies vaccination.

Dogs and cats originating from outside Wisconsin

All dogs and domestic cats shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and have proof of a current rabies vaccination if the dog or cat is five months old. See ATCP 10.80 for specific vaccination information.

CIRCUS, RODEO, RACING AND MENAGERIE ANIMALS

All shall have a permit from the Department, and shall be isolated from all non-circus, non-rodeo, and non-menagerie animals at the exhibition. They must meet current import requirements. Phone 608-224-4874 for a permit application. Fair managers:

Please note that this requirement applies to all animals belonging to midway attractions and rodeos.

ADVISORY FOR HOUSING NONTRADITIONAL LIVESTOCK AND FOR MANAGEMENT OF OTHER ANIMALS WHILE THE FAIR IS UNDERWAY:

The Department makes the following recommendations, but these are not required by statute or administrative rule:

1. Exotic camelids (llamas, vicuhas, alpacas, and guanacos), other exotic ruminants and cervidae are not housed with domestic cattle.
2. Ratites (ostriches, emus, rheas, and cassowaries) should not be housed with domestic poultry.
3. Swine should not be housed with other mammalian species.
4. Bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) is an infectious disease of cattle that can spread rapidly under the conditions of a livestock show. The Department strongly recommends that all breeding cattle exhibited at Wisconsin fairs be properly vaccinated against BVD at least 30 days prior to the show. Exhibitors should consult with their veterinarians regarding the proper choice of vaccine and the correct schedule for its administration.
5. All cattle must test negative for BVD-PI by blood test or ear-notch test.
6. Recommend that cattle should test negative for Johne's disease by the ELISA test.
7. **Prohibit the use of common watering and feeding troughs.**
8. Recommend all vehicles used to transport animals to and from the exhibition, or used at the exhibition, be cleaned and disinfected prior to and after use for this purpose.
9. Require all animals found to be afflicted with a contagious or infectious disease to be promptly removed from the premises.
10. Provide hand wash stations near all livestock facilities.
11. Recommend that all fairs add a space on livestock entry forms for the Premises Registration Code.

NO EXHIBITOR OR EXHIBITOR'S PARENT MAY APPROACH A JUDGE WITHOUT A SUPERINTENDENT PRESENT AND MUST BE DONE AFTER ALL JUDGING IS COMPLETE.

Any youth exhibitor, who is smoking, possessing, or consuming alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs will be immediately requested to vacate the grounds and forfeit all rights to premiums and/or participation in the show.

I hereby agree to abide by the above and all rules governing the care, stabling, and showing of horses at the Kewaunee County Fair. I understand that failure to abide by these rules may result in disciplinary action by the Kewaunee County Fairboard. The action may include removal of my horse, all my exhibits, and myself from the Kewaunee County Fair for a period of one year. Further disciplinary actions may be imposed by your governing group.

2023 Kewaunee County Fair Horse Open class & Jr. Fair Exhibitor Barn Rules

ALL horses that have been granted stall privileges **must** be brought to the fairgrounds during the time designated (WED 8 -8pm). Dairyland Veterinary Services will again be on the grounds for the duration of the fair. Kewaunee County requires that all horses have a current negative Coggins (EIA test) completed. The original will be verified and a photocopy of the test results will be retained. Ensure your premise ID is written on your Coggins. Any health issues will be decided by the vet on duty. If you have requested and been assigned stalls, you must bring your horse to the fair. The only excused absence will be with a veterinarian's excuse or a medical doctor's excuse. All future stall privileges can be lost if you do not bring a horse. **All trailers left on the fairgrounds will be parked west of the horse ring. Trailers parked elsewhere will be towed at the owner's expense.**

Exhibitor is solely responsible for care of their horse to include feeding, watering, bedding (shavings only), cleaning of stall, etc. Morning chores (feeding & cleaning of stalls) shall be done prior to 9am, when the fair opens to the public. Common water pails may only be used by exhibitors from the same farm/barn. Only exhibitors will be allowed to ride any horse stabled at the fair.?? Trainer issue brought up??

Exhibitors will wear shoes/boots (**NO flip-flops, crocks, sandals, or open toed shoes**) while handling a horse and appropriate show clothing will be worn while exhibiting (Clothing must cover undergarments). Remember you are representing your family, your farm, your club, and your county.

Horses are to be kept strictly in areas specified for showing, bathing, and stabling of HORSES on the fairground (near horse barn and wash rack). Notify the barn supt. if participating in the fair parade. Horses ridden in the ring must be tacked (no bareback) and rider must have hard soled shoes & a helmet. Pick up after yourself, to include the wash rack (pails, soap, etc) and your horse (pick up manure). Please turn the water faucets off and coil the hoses after each use. Everyone stabled is responsible for clean up of the grounds and aisles in the barn (rake hay & bedding from the aisles, and hose down the dust).

No electrical food appliances are allowed in the barn (microwave, refrigerator, crock pots, pizza ovens, etc)

Use of the show ring: Horses may be exercised in 15 min. increments, with adult supervision by exhibitor's parent or superintendent. Lounging will be done in the holding area. Horses stabled together may be turned out together(loose to run inside the ring) but must be supervised while in the ring. A signup sheet with times will be posted on Wednesday. All activity must be approved by the fair board.

When draft horses are cross-tied in the aisle for prep/show/parade, the aisle will be closed to the public.

The horse barn closes at **10:00pm**. Owners and exhibitors may not sleep overnight in the barn. Barn superintendents have the authority and will be treated with respect.

All stalls are required to be secured each night. A lead rope or chain to secure is requested. Decorations will be secured by staples only, no screws or nails are allowed. All staples will be removed prior to check out. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure that all stalls are completely cleaned out BEFORE any horses leave the fairgrounds. Exhibitors may lose future stall privileges if not complied with. A barn superintendent will check your stall before you leave.

Animals may not leave the fairgrounds prior to release time on Sunday. Any animals removed prior to release time will have the exhibitor subject to disciplinary actions set forth at the fair board's discretion. Decorations may be taken down after **4:30** pm. Animals will be released by barns and assigned times. Check with your barn Superintendant for your release times.

An overall winner (non-premium) will be determined based on a live and carcass ranking formula. 1. The QLCC is open to any junior exhibitor currently enrolled in the 4-H or FFA sheep project.
2. The animal must be owned and shown by the junior exhibitor.
3. Wethers or ewes may be entered in the QLCC.
4. QLCC animals must be weighed in at Lamb Weigh-In, Saturday, May 6 2023. Final weigh-in will be at the Kewaunee County Fair.

5. Each exhibitor may weigh-in and enter one (1) QLCC animal. The designated QLCC animal must be designated at weigh-in and may not be replaced by another animal.
6. Lambs must weigh (live weight) a minimum of 85 pounds at the Kewaunee County Fair.
7. Lambs will be shown during the sheep show in the LIVE CARCASS CLASS at the fair and may not be entered or shown in any other class other than showmanship.
8. QLCC animals will be transported to a predetermined processing facility on the final day of the fair. All QLCC lambs must be processed at the predetermined facility, with no exceptions.
9. Exhibitors are responsible for slaughter cost or finding a buyer for their QLCC animal. All exhibitors should submit the name and phone number of the buyer to Crystal Bailey at weigh-in at the fair.
10. Carcass lambs must be slick shorn.

Re: 2023 Fair Traffic Pattern & Release Protocol

The Kewaunee County Fair Board has again adopted a traffic pattern to be used for the 2023 fair. **All trailers will enter through the West gate** (pit area off of Frontier Rd) and **will exit the fairgrounds through the North gate** (D&S). Decorations can be taken down no sooner than 4:30 pm. All tack must be taken down and ready to load before you line up your trailer. You will not be allowed to pull your trailer in and then start taking decorations down. The 30 minutes prior to animal release is to be used for this purpose. The barns will again be closed to the public at 4:30pm to make packing up and taking down decorations easier. Please utilize this time to make the exit process run smooth.

The **dairy barn** and the **small animal barn** will be released first, starting at **5:00pm**. The **livestock barn** will follow starting at **5:30pm**. The **horse barn** will follow at **5:45pm**. Superintendents of these barns will release animals along with the fairboard members working on Sunday at release time.

Trailers that were off site for the duration of the fair will enter from the West gate and park in the pit area on Sunday. **NO TRAILERS will be allowed to be parked in the pit area during the fair. ALL TRAILERS will be parked west of horse ring on the grass area.** A designated number of trailers will be allowed to enter at a time to avoid a large backup of trailers on the grounds. We again ask for everyone's patience as everyone wants to go home. Again this year ALL hogs and beef will be going home on Sunday night. This will make load out more time consuming, please be patient.

In addition, the areas south of the dairy barn and north of the livestock barn will be kept free from vehicles, trailers, machinery, feed, etc. Vehicles will be towed if in violation. **All personally owned off-road vehicles (gators, mules, skid loaders, etc.) will require a Certificate of Insurance to be turned in to the fair board president PRIOR to the start of the fair to be kept on file.** There will be a designated area for fitting chutes on the south side of the dairy barn, no chutes will be in any barns. Again these decisions were made for safety purposes as well as maintaining a neat and pleasant appearance around the barns. We ask you to respect the hard work that went into these efforts to make the Kewaunee County Fair one to be proud of. Thank you.

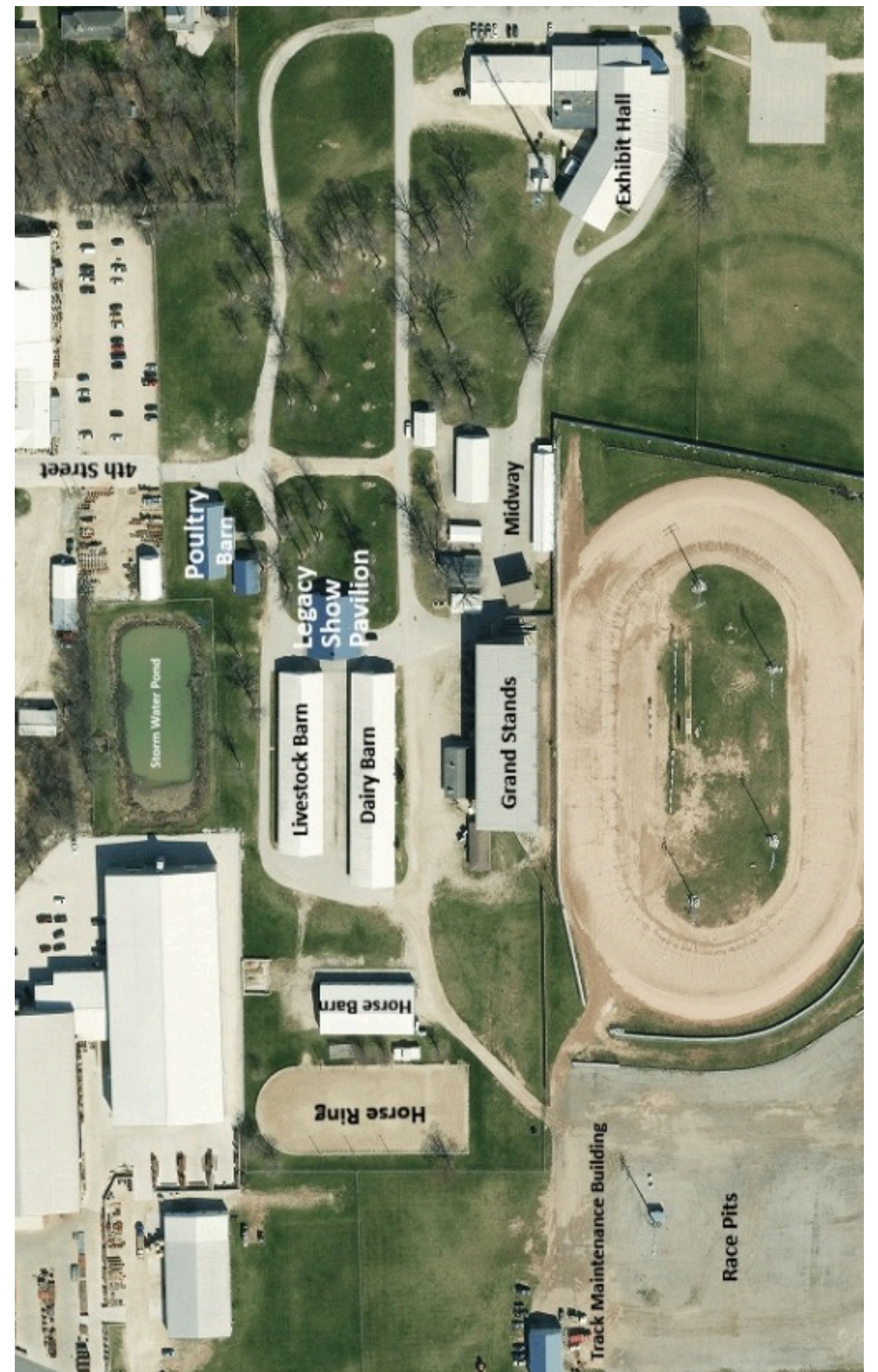

CLASS C - CAKE DECORATING

4-H members must be enrolled in Project Cake Decorating.

A member may exhibit up to two entries.

The base may NOT be of items other than a baked cake.

Cake must be decorated out of a baking pan on a suitable flat surface, fit to size of cake. Cake boards should be no larger than 2" wider than the shape of the cake with exhibitors name on the bottom.

Decorator frosting must be used on cakes/cupcakes. No coconut topping will be permitted.

The cakes must be left on display. Exhibitors will not be able to take their cakes home. Cakes will be disposed of at the end of the fair. The exhibitors may pick up their cake boards after 5 pm Sunday.

CLASS E - FOOD PRESERVATION

4-H members must be enrolled in Projects Food Preservation or Food & Nutrition.

Jars must be clean. All fruits, vegetables, and pickles should be in regulation, clear glass pint jars - one jar of each unless otherwise stated. Rings must be removed while exhibiting.

Jam & Jelly must be in regulation, clear, 1/2 pint jelly jar.

All non-acid vegetables must be canned in a pressure canner. Open bottle method is not eligible.

Entries may be opened and sampled if judge deems it necessary.

All entries must be labeled. Labels should include: date of preserving; time and method of preservation. Jars not labeled will not be judged.

All preserved food must have been processed after previous year's fair.

No paraffin is allowed on jams or jellies. Jars must be sealed with a lid.

'Any other item' must be labeled as what it is.

All recipes, Procedures and times followed must be according to the USDA and/or National Center for Home Preservation recommendations. NO FAMILY RECIPES.
